General Matters

Looking back on 2016 I wish to acknowledge all that has been achieved by the Services in what has been a very challenging year. These achievements could not have taken place without the commitment, hard work and dedication of all staff throughout the organisation. I wish to sincerely thank you all for the work that you do on behalf of the Brothers of Charity Services Limerick.

Within our Adult Services we are facing the challenge of supporting a group of people who are aging and require a different model of supports. Every effort is made by management and staff to continue supporting people in their home and day service. However situations do arise where we cannot continue to support the person because of their changing needs. As a Service we are not allowed to employ additional staff to provide the necessary supports. The HSE has instructed that we must operate within our budget. This means we have to look to alternative options including the use of nursing homes. This is not a preference of the Brothers of Charity Services Limerick but a reality of where we find ourselves. As a service we are advocating for the development of a specific plan to support people with intellectual disabilities who are aging. It is our hope that this will be progressed in 2017. Difficult decisions had to be made in 2016 with reaard to the use of nursing homes. I want to acknowledge that these decisions were difficult for the person being supported, their families, staff and friends but unfortunately these decisions were made in the context of the resources we have and the changing needs of the individual and the requirement to provide a safe and appropriate service.

As you will see from this magazine there are many exciting developments and experiences happening for people within our services as we continue to promote community inclusion and opportunities for people in our service to have a good life. This is a testament to the management and staff working in Community and Integrated Services and the clinicians that support them. Also in this regard I want to thank the Advocacy Committee for their contribution to the services this year. A strong advocacy voice for the people attending our service is a strength for the Services. I want to sincerely thank the Chair of the Advocacy group, Anne O'Callaghan as well as Liz Phelan Head of Quality and Kate O'Connor for all their hard work and vision in supporting this group. I also want to thank the facilitators throughout the services who are charged with the responsibility of making advocacy available for everyone who attends our services and ensuring that the issues that matter to people are raised and heard and responded to on an ongoing basis. In this edition of the Grapevine you will read about how the Limerick Advocacy group made presentations at the National Conference this year. It was a very proud moment for the Services seeing how well the Advocates from Limerick performed in front of a full conference room and a great opportunity to share in their experience with the Services

In our Children's Services there have been a number of very positive developments taking place which ensure that the finite resources allocated to Children Services are used to their best advantage for the children and families accessing this service. The model of service provision within Children Services is called family centred practice. This model is about listening to what the priorities of the family and child are and then supporting the family and child to develop the skills needed to achieve these priorities. During 2016 we received funding from the HSE for a new Speech and Language Therapist. This was a very positive development. We continue to engage with the HSE to secure further resources to fund additional clinicians to meet the needs of a growing service which currently supports over 400 children. I wish to acknowledge the work of Aisling Finucane, Head of Children Services and her team for all the positive developments that have taken place in Children Services in 2016 and for their continued focus on providing the best service possible for children in West Limerick.

During 2016 20 staff members retired from the service representing many years of service. This week sees the retirement of Noreen Ryan, Head of Integrated Services who has worked in the services for over 38 years. Noreen has been a committed, dedicated and hardworking member of staff throughout her long career with the Brothers of Charity Services Limerick. Both as a front line staff and as a member of the Senior Management Team Noreen has worked tirelessly in all the roles she has performed over those years. In each role Noreen has carried, promoted and delivered on the mission and values of the Brothers of Charity Services. On behalf of The Brothers of Charity Services Limerick I want to sincerely thank Noreen and all the retired staff for their commitment to the services and to wish them all good health and happiness in their retirement.

In the last number of weeks you would have all received a letter from Brother Alfred Hassett, Chair of the Brothers of Charity Services Ireland letting you know about the change to the structures of the Brothers of Charity Services Ireland. Essentially this restructuring is about developing a strong national company that will provide leadership as well as supporting accountability, transparency and compliance. This will help in ensuring that those who fund our services and the public have confidence in how we do our business. Since 2007 this leadership has been provided by a local board made up of volunteers who have given of their time freely and with generosity of spirit. Throughout the years the guidance, wisdom and direction the Board has offered the Services has been immeasurable. On behalf of the services I wish to sincerely thank the current board, Gerard Lyons (Chairperson), Gere O'Byrne, Patrick Brosnan, Kieron Brennan and also past boards for all the work they have done for The Brothers of Charity Services Limerick and for guiding us through challenging times and for always remaining steadfast and strong. Thank you.

Report Writing: A Guide for Staff

The words we use and the way they are recorded give clarity, understanding and a meaning to actions, choices and decisions.

"A Guide for Staff" document is currently being drafted to offer guidance and suggestions in respect of writing reports such as daily reports, incident reports, CP1 and monitoring forms.

The guide is intended for support workers, one to-one staff members and others who work directly with Service Users.

When writing any report, it is important to remember that:

- Service Users can and will have access to their own records
- Notes could be read out in a court of law subject to Freedom of Information Law 1997.

The following is a brief list of do's and don'ts which forms part of the document. It is anticipated that a full document will be available to all Staff by end of November.

DO's and DON'Ts

DO

- Identify the Service User on each page
- Write legibly
- Use permanent black ink
- Avoid errors in grammar, spelling and punctuation
- Correct any errors with a single line through so the error is still legible, then sign and indicate designation
- Document facts not assumptions or opinions
- Date/Time/Name/Designation/Sign
- Indicate other service users within the report anonymously
- Where possible, ask the person about their day, what do they feel should be recorded?
- What activities the person has undertaken that day, did they choose not to do some of the activities, what reasons did they give?
- What has that person had to eat or drink;
- Medical or Therapy Appointments: Where did the person go? Who did they see? Has anything changed? How do we follow this up?
- Has there been a need to implement behaviour support guidelines? What were the triggers? How was this managed?
- Medication changes: Has the medication changed?
- What have you observed about the person's general health and mood, is the person reacting in a differently?

DON'T

- Erase or use corrective fluid
- Enter any identifying information about another person.
- Amend someone else's notes
- Make suggestions
- Use slang terms or jargon
- Diagnose unless clinically qualified to do so
- Subjective comments
- Use slang/unauthorised abbreviations
- Use poor or illegible handwriting
- Don't use phrases such as "all well" and "no concerns" without providing examples/ supporting evidence.

Thoughts on Person Centeredness

The Brothers of Charity Services Limerick is committed to striving to deliver a person centred service to the people that we support. To this end, each individual is assigned a keyworker whose primary responsibility is to support the individual to develop a person centred plan. The aim of the plan is to gather information on what the person's life is like now, what the person would like their life to be like in the future and what supports they required to move towards their goals.

Person centred planning was developed as a way to move away from traditional models of service where individuals were required to 'fit' into pre-existing services or where professionals decided what was best for the individual towards a model of service which recognises that each individual has a right to determine their own priorities and to receives the types of supports that will help them live the life they choose.

Over the years the Brothers of Charity Services Limerick has reviewed the documentation that we use to support the person centred planning process in response to feedback from staff and managers using the document. We have spent a lot of time focusing on the process and trying to get to the point where the documentation is an aid to prompting meaningful conversation and the identification of real priorities for the individual. At this point the organisation has an information gathering process which is based on CQLs Personal Outcomes Measures and is supported by the introduction of the Adaptive Behaviour Scale to encourage consideration of people's strengths and potential as well as the introduction of INSATA, current used as a management tool in the context of the PCP process to facilitate management oversight of the process.

Supporting person centred planning within a large organisation can be challenging. Experts in the field caution that resources, excessive attention to the process rather than to outcomes, the attitude of the keyworker and regulatory requirements can all conspire against the realisation of person centred supports for an individual. In the context of recent management training, we had an opportunity to reflect on these challenges and to remind ourselves of the importance of focusing on outcomes for people. As a large organisation which is subject to regulation there is a requirement to ensure that we can evidence the work that we are doing to support people. There is therefore a need to ensure that the processes we have are followed. However, in doing this the challenge is not to lose sight of the bigger picture – the process is just a means to an ends, the real work is in supporting people to identify and work towards priorities that are meaningful to them and that will help to enhance their quality of life.

Kendrick (2007) summarised this well in his article 'On Being Somewhat Person Centered'. To me, three key points in his article highlight the challenge and the opportunity that we as staff have in trying to provide person centred services to the people we support.

He notes that

'.....there are always limitations, constraints, competing interests, priorities and responsibilities that condition any involvement with another person.

It is really in doing "what we can with what we have" on behalf of another person that makes us momentarily "person centred".

"Person centeredness" is revealed not simply by the intentions to be of assistance to others, but rather by the genuineness of the efforts taken to do so.'
